117 HOMES

participated by testing for radon gas during the winter/spring of 2022. This represents approximately 3% of the community dwellings.

55% of homes tested above Health Canada's guideline of 200 Bq/m³.



Radon is a naturally occurring radioactive gas that comes from the ground.



Exposure to elevated levels of radon is linked to increased chances of developing lung cancer.

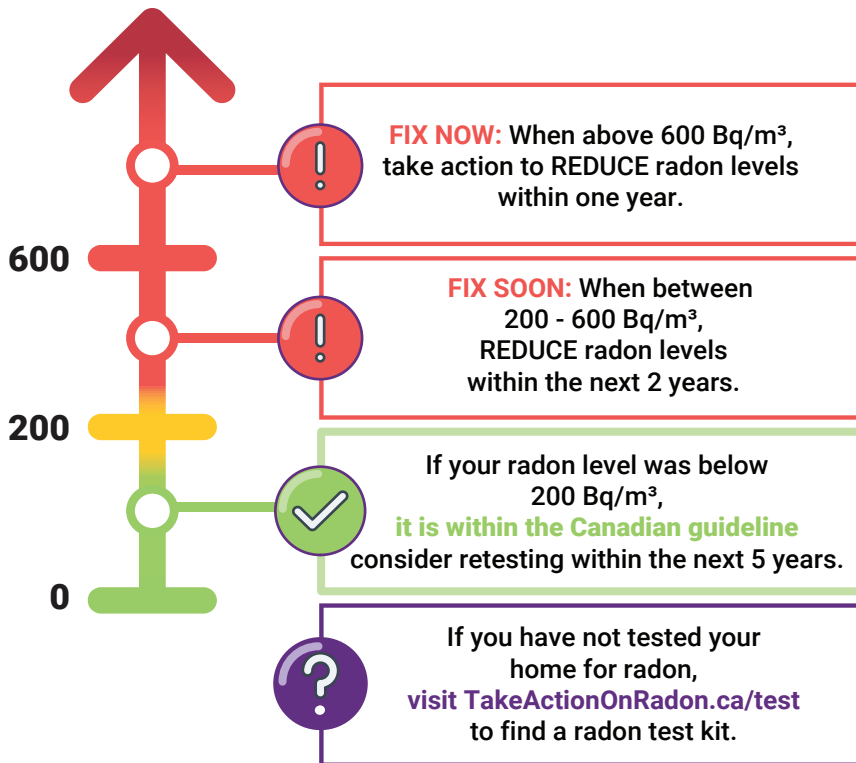


OVER 200 Bq/m³

Levels can vary between neighbouring houses. The only way to know your radon level is to test.



Radon enters a home through contact with the ground and can build up to elevated levels.



HOW TO FIND A CERTIFIED PROFESSIONAL

Certified radon mitigation professionals are trained to properly assess your home, and design systems to efficiently and effectively reduce your radon level.

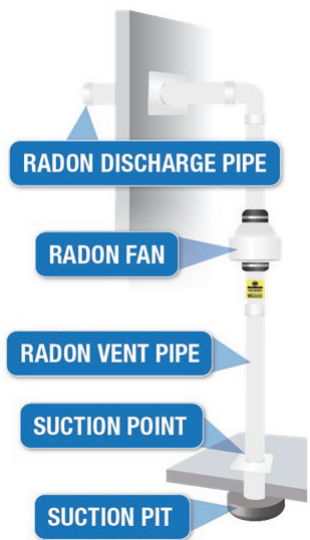

Radon gas levels are reduced the most by installing a **radon mitigation system**. Research shows that **certified radon professionals** can reduce levels by over 90%. Other steps, such as increasing ventilation and sealing cracks, can help in the short-term but are less effective.

radon mitigation system

A **radon mitigation system** is installed with a fan that draws air (and radon) up from beneath the foundation and discharges the radon to the outdoors. This system reduces radon levels by preventing radon from entering your home.

Since 2011, the Saskatchewan Building Code has required the installation of a short “radon stub pipe” through the basement floor of new houses. This is not a complete radon mitigation system; it is simply the connection point if a system is required. Every home needs to be tested for radon for at least 91 days, during the heating season to determine if a mitigation system is required.
